**** Call to Worship and Confession***

P: Here we stand in the presence of God:
formed in God’s image, filled with God’s Spirit and gathered
together in love.

A: We come here to begin, again, the season of Lent,
to remember the one who came to save us,
to not look away as he turns toward the cross,
but to watch as he leads us past death to salvation.

**C: Now as we gather, we look toward him, and wonder,
when God looks at us, what sin does he see that separates
us from his goodness?**

P: By grace, God calls us from grief into gladness, from despair into
hope.

A: And by God’s grace, we stand in the mystery of the divine and
confess:

C: Holy God, have mercy on us.

P: For self-centered living and for thinking that we are better than others,

A: For failure to live in humility and gentleness with you, our God,
and with our fellow humans:

C: Have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and turn us toward you.

P: For longing to have what is not ours, and for not appreciating the gifts God has given to us,

A: For the misuse of human relationships and for an unwillingness to see the image of God in others:

C: Have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and turn us toward you.

P: For jealousies, rivalries and anger that divide families and nations,

A: For lies, betrayals and judgmental speaking that sows seeds of mistrust, hurt and fear.

C: Have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and turn us toward you.

P: For reluctance to share the gifts of God and for carelessness with your creation,

A: For the times we have not trusted in God to provide enough for our needs and the needs of others,

C: Have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and turn us toward you.

P: For idleness in witnessing to Jesus Christ and for squandering the gifts of love and grace that were so freely given to us,

A: For hording salvation as our private gift and refusing to tell others of the hope we have found in you,

C: Have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and turn us toward you.

P: Loving God we confess that we have not lived into our calling or up to our potential,

A: we have not loved you more than all things.

P: May God turn us from our sin, from all temptation and use our lives as beacons of light in this world of darkness.

C: Amen.

**Greeting*

P: The Lord be with you.

C: And also with you.

P: Let us pray. Almighty and ever-living God,

C: you do not hate anything you have made, and you forgive the sins of all who turn from sin and return to your way. Create in us new and honest hearts, so that, truly repenting of our sins, we may receive from you, the God of all mercy, full forgiveness of our sins and the gift of a restored life, a gift from our Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen.

**Imposition of Ashes:*

P: Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth. Without you, dust is all that will ever become of us. May these ashes not just leave a mark on our skin but a brand on our hearts; that we may leave remembering that the cost of our sin is death and that you loved us enough to purchase our life with your blood. We are unworthy of that love, Lord, yet even now we come to you, humbled and full of regret. Change our hearts even as we turn from our sin and embrace your life.

C: Let it be so, Lord. Change our hearts, accept our lives as our offering.

You may come forward and stand to receive the ashes.

*After those who desire ashes have received them,
all may sit and reflect in silence until the minister continues.*

First Reading: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

¹Blow the trumpet in Zion;

sound the alarm on my holy mountain!

Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble,

for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near—

²a day of darkness and gloom,

a day of clouds and thick darkness!

Like blackness spread upon the mountains
a great and powerful army comes;

Responsive Reading: Psalm 51:1-17

R: Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love;
according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions.

C: Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin.

R: For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me.

C: Against you, you alone, have I sinned, and done what is evil in your sight,

R: so that you are justified in your sentence and blameless when you pass judgment.

C: Indeed, I was born guilty, a sinner when my mother conceived me.

R: You desire truth in the inward being; therefore teach me wisdom in my secret heart.

C: Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.

R: Let me hear joy and gladness; let the bones that you have crushed rejoice.

C: Hide your face from my sins, and blot out all my iniquities.

R: Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me.

C: Do not cast me away from your presence, and do not take your holy spirit from me.

R: Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit.

C: Then I will teach transgressors your ways, and sinners will return to you.

R: Deliver me from bloodshed, O God, O God of my salvation, and my tongue will sing aloud of your deliverance.

C: O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise.

R: For you have no delight in sacrifice; if I were to give a burnt offering, you would not be pleased.

C: The sacrifice acceptable to God is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10

We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

⁶As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive;

as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

C: Glory to you, O Lord.

***Gospel Reading:** Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

[Jesus said to the disciples] "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. ²"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward.

³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

⁵"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁶"And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

P: We offer all of these prayers to you, our Savior. We know that you love us, that you hear us, and that you want what is best for us.

****Invitation to Remove Ashes and Receive the Healing Promises of Christ***

P: Our Savior reminded us to beware of practicing our piety before others in an effort to be seen

A: and we are also reminded that we have been marked with the cross of Christ and the seal of the Holy Spirit, our whole life long.

P: Tonight as you exit the worship space, go slowly, take your time. Use this quiet time as a moment to rest with God.

A: We invite you to stop at the baptismal font, take a cloth, dip it into the water from the font and remember that you are loved beyond measure.

P: Remember that you are claimed as a child of God,

A: but the cost of redemption was high.

P: You have been forgiven and washed clean.

A: See your image in the mirror and remember, you were created in the image of God.

P: You are a people created to be holy to the Lord your God.

A: Look at the cross of ash and remember that God was not willing to lose you.

P: Even if the path to redemption led first to the cross.

A: Remember as you wipe the ashes from your head, the cost of our forgiveness

P: Then go into your Lenten journey, restored and made whole by the loving grace of our God.

A: Who was not willing to leave us as ashes but who came to set us free from sin and death,

P: And to offer us new life.
